St. Andrew's Choir Sings Live on BBC Radio

It sounds so glamorous! And we were, to be sure, quite honored and excited. During our travel around England this past June, we were invited to sing for BBC Lancashire. But even the most glamorous moments have their proverbial feet of clay.

To start with, we couldn't find the studio, even with a local Lancashire priest guiding us. We drove up this lane and down that alleyway (driving on the wrong side of the street) looking for parking. We only had 30 minutes before the showwent on the air! And the vans we drove turned out to be too tall for the garage nearest the studio. Sigh. What to do?

Somehow, finally, we found parking and arrived breathless, but full of anticipation, at BBC Lancashire's radio studios.

By we, of course, I mean the combined St. Andrew's Academy and Good Shepherd choir, together for almost three weeks for our tour of Britain which was highlighted in the special edition of *The Standard* this past July. This group, assem-

bled in the BBC Lancashire studio, sang three pieces over about an hour of *The Sally Naden Show*. The choir first sang "O, Praise God," a choral rendition of Psalm 150, followed by "The Day is Past and Gone" by Christopher West. The finale was William Byrd's "Ave Verum Corpus."

The students and staff also talked with the hostess, Sally Naden, during the show. Since America was to play Britain the following evening in the World Cup, this competitive topic took up much of the interview time. One Brit on the show predicted that England would beat America at six-to-one, but Christian Anderson, of Good Shepherd School, countered it would be an American victory at two-to-one. As

it turns out, Anderson was much closer in his call. The game ended a draw, at 1-1.

The live broadcast was not available to parents and friends back home, but an archived recording was on the internet for a few weeks, so that loved ones were able actually to hear the choristers perform on their England trip.

Our very own Father Foos was asked to lead a workshop on plainsong chant. "None of the other choristers had ever seen, much less heard of, plainsong chant," said Father Foos. "They were all game, however, and listened attentively. They also did a fair job with chanting Psalm 23 for the concert that evening."

The combined choirs and choristers sang a number of songs at the concert which they had worked up that day. The two complete choirs in attendance also sang pieces from their own repertoires during the concert. Those that were able to stay for Sunday morning (including the St. Andrew's choristers) sang the music for the Eucharist. The Choir Festivalweekend also happened to coincide with the Episcopal visit of Bishop John-David Schofield to St. Timothy's. It was the first time Father Foos had had the

Missionary to Argentina Visits St. Andrew's

ather David Alenskis, missionary to South America, paid a visit to St. Andrew's Academy this past October as part of his trip to raise support up and down the West Coast. The St. Andrew's Choir first met him in the summer of 2009, when the choir was touring down to San Diego and back. His home church, Church of the Resurrection in San Marcos, housed, fed, and worshiped with the choir over three days that we were there.

Father Alenskis has served as a missionary to South America three different times; two summer stays and a year-long time of service in an orphanage in Peru. He plans to leave for Buenos Aires, Argentina, early this coming year to serve under Archbishop Gregory Venebles.

On the feast of St. Luke, who was a missionary and minister,

Father Alenskis preached at the service held in the St. Andrew's chapel and then addressed the congregation afterward concerning his upcoming mission.

Buenos Aires seems to be a fascinating city. Says Father Alenskis, "The nearly 13 million citizens of Greater Buenos Aires, often referred to as porteños, have inherited a culture which is part European and part gaucho (cowboy), an odd cosmopolitan blend of traditionalism, modernity, and a fierce spirit of independence." It is also desperately in need of revival by the gospel, having suffered "from corruption and from red tape, from uprisings and from dictators, from extortion and from debt.... In short, the people of Buenos Aires, along with Argentina as a whole, had pinned their hope for themselves and for their society on a vision of progress and prosperity bequeathed to them by European modernity, but in the last few decades this goal has come crashing down around them."

These things being so, the people of Buenos Aires, and of Argentina generally, are sliding into despair. In this condition, then, they desperately need to hear the gospel of Christ, and it is this call which Father Alenskis is answering.

Father David also joined the St. Andrew's Choir for rehearsals during the few days he was in town, singing whatever part was asked of him. He spoke some Spanish for the students, and even some Latin, which delighted the 2nd and 3rd form.

We wish him well in his ministry, and our prayers go with him.
